This now brings me to the week of the festival, which is yet to pass as I write this, but of course has already happened as you read these words. As the pictures you see on the page will demonstrate, taken during the set up last year, quite a lot goes into the few days before the event happens. On the Monday we bring in all the racking for the barrels, the bar (which needs to be put together) and the pumps. We also take delivery (hopefully) of all the Beers and other drinks as well as the glasses needed to drink them from.

The Tuesday onwards is a combination of fitting things together, putting up the banners and boards displaying the logos of our kind sponsors and quite often blind panic when we sometimes wonder if it will all come together in time. Invariably, and sometimes we're not sure just quite how, it does all come together thanks to the effort of lots of individuals offering their time for free, who somehow mould into a winning team greater than the sum of its parts.

Finally, after spending the 3 nights of the actual Beerfest itself having a great time, creating memories which will stay with us for many years, the time to clear up comes on the Sunday. Empty barrels are taken away (always the sign of a good event when they are empty!), the bar taken down and everything put into storage, except for the fine men and women who helped make it happen in the first place.

To all of those who help I say a massive thank you as it wouldn't happen without you – and to those who attend and show us the effort was all worthwhile, an even big thanks!

ne of the highlights of the annual calendar for many Tablers is the varied and interesting sporting events which take place during the year, both on a regional and national scale.

For example, Area 34, of which Lancaster Round Table is based, encompasses Tables from Blackburn, Clitheroe, Rossendale, Preston and Blackpool, and has a continuing sporting tradition of competition between the different Round Tables every year running between May and April.

Each respective Round Table sends out teams along the course of the year to compete for both individual sports trophies and to collect points as a team for the prestigious crown of overall sporting Table for the year. 'Sports' are as varied as Golf, Ten Pin Bowling, Poker, Cricket, Football, Pool and Basketball, to name a few, so the chances are you will experience something new. The emphasis is always on having fun, though there is always a competitive edge to each event.

At the moment, as I write this with two events of the year to go, we are in an almost



identical position as last year in the area sports trophy, with Lancaster at the top of the table. This year it is a lot closer, with the Area Ten Pin Bowling due to take place just before the Beerfest, and the last event hosted in Lancaster in March, it could go right down to the wire.



If we manage to do well in those last two events then Lancaster will be crowned Area Champions once again for the second year in a row – even more remarkable when you consider we had never even won the Trophy before last year despite its long history.

Every September the Area sporting calendar is turned on its head, as our closest rivals from Area join forces with us to compete against other Areas around the country in an



event appropriately titled 'National Sporting Weekend'.

Last year this national event took place in Leeds, moving on from Lancaster as the host in 2010. Over 20 Areas made up teams



from all over the UK and our very own Area 34 earned a respectable 4th place overall, winning the flagship event of the 5-a-side football along the way, with myself and two other Lancastrian Tablers Ben Robinson and Ken Parker making up the bulk of the winning team.

This proved to be a proud moment for us and the rest of the team as we were presented with our medals and the Trophy by the world championships gold medal winner Kriss Akabusi, who was guest speaker for the night at the after event Gala dinner.

If you would like to know more about Round Table and the sporting events we participate in then just ask any of the Table members you see around the Beerfest hall and they will happily point you in my direction.

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



# **REAL ale in real** Lancashire

#### Where is Lancashire?

he land that came to form the County Palatine of Lancashire began to be assembled shortly after the Norman Conquest in 1066 when Roger of Piotou acquired all the territory from the River Mersey in the south to the River Duddon in the North. This land known as the 'Hounor of Lancaster', after Roger established the administrative centre in Lancaster, included Furness, Cartmel, Lonsdale, as well as Manchester, Stockport and Liverpool.

It was under King Henry II's Reign that the term County of Lancashire was first used to describe this area. The importance of Lancashire to the Crown was formalized when in the 14th Century Lancashire was granted Palatine status and with it extraordinary powers granted to the Duke of Lancaster.

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When County Councils were established in the late 19th century, they were devised upon the traditional territories within the counties and therefore Lancashire continued to encompass that Furness peninsular. The 1974 administrative counties did not alter the traditional boundaries of Lancashire. Whilst new administrative and unitary authorities have been established since 1974 they have not changed that geographical nature of the original County Palatine of Lancashire. The Lancashire Cup, now in

d its 2nd year, f has been n organised d by the Lancaster 160 Round Table as part of its annual Beer Festival with the aim of getting Lancashire Brewers together in one place celebrating the great product of our County whilst fundraising for local charities.

A panel of independent judges (not from the Lancashire Brewers competing), consisting of some of the top palettes and recognised names in the world of beer, including the celebrated beer writer Jeff Pickthall, have been asked to judge the six categories of the competition (Best, Bitter, Premium, Strong, Porter Mild & Stout and Speciality), with the overall Supreme Champion of the Lancashire Cup named from the Class winners.

As with the inaugural trophy last year Brewers from Old Lancashire have also been invited to compete and the completion boundaries include that of the County Palatine of Lancashire (see left).

Brewing in Lancashire can be traced back well over two hundred years,

and in the Lancashire Cup we h a v e two of t h e oldest brewers in Lancashire. With over 350 years of combined brewing experience Daniel Thwaites of Blackburn (est. 1807), J.W Lees of Middleton N. Manchester (est.1827) representing the old guard of brewing with established beers and reputations.

These regional giants are however equals in the Lancashire Cup with brewers that have been established only a few months or years. Cross Bay Brewery is the youngest of this year's completion, brewing for the first time in 2011. The smallest brewers this year are Greenodd, Hopstar and Mayflower all of which are around one hundred times smaller in brew length than that of Thwaites.

Brewers were asked to submit just two beers each, for which they were paid a nominal fee to cover their costs. Those taking up the chance to compete were offered additional spaces in the competition but in the spirit of charity and fairness each additional beer was donated free of charge to the Round Table. In addition to all the Lancashire Cup entrants we have decided to also include some guest beers on the roster from outside the competition boundaries. These fortunate few will not be entered into the competition, but are here to give us an example of some of the finest beers from elsewhere in the country, so please enjoy – responsibly of course.



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
